No, I am *not* going to write the story where Harry (either this Harry, or canon!Harry) ends up as Headmaster of Hogwarts during the Sorting Ceremony. You're welcome to do so if you wish.

I have to confess I'm a bit new to this medium and not clear on the exact rules. I got several complaints about trying to put the omake in the middle of the story, and one reviewer suggested a separate story for Omake. This makes a lot of sense to me, and what I'd really like to do is have a separate story for Omake and Author's Notes on a per-chapter basis, so that anyone who wanted to get the Author's Notes could subscribe. But another person said the last chapter was against the Guidelines because I'm not allowed to reply to reviews, and while reading the Guidelines again didn't show me where it said *that*, the Guidelines *did* seem to say that I can't create a separate story for Author's Notes.

The best solution I've come up with is having my profile always contain the Author's Notes for the current chapter. This means a Note vanishes when the next chapter is posted, which I'm not really happy with as a solution - especially since it means the last Author's Notes were only left up for less than 24 hours - but my guess is that this will provide the best service to the most readers. I *am* saving the old Notes, and may put up a complete webpage containing them at some point or other.

I think that I shall go ahead and express a bit of surprise at all the people who wrote in to say, not just that they personally disliked the omake, but that it was a terrible, horrible bad thing that indicated disrespect for the readers. If you look at the reviews, you'll see that quite a few other people got quite a bit of pleasure out of it. Yes, I'm sure they were all morons, but my point is: does it really seem like posting omake was intended as a *personal insult* to you? Especially since it was my *first* try at posting omake and I had no idea how *you* would react? I am not going to censor myself *preemptively*. I do respond to reader feedback; if a lot of people hate something I probably won't do it again, and if everyone hates something I may go back and rewrite it. But I can't know the ratio of upvotes to downvotes until I *try*.

Right now, for example, I'm trying to put the Author's Notes in the profile, and assuming that since anyone who dislikes ANs won't encounter them, that means they're allowed to be a little longer and a little more personal. If that still doesn't work for you, let me know.

Please don't worry about this story changing too much to pander to the reviewers. In total seriousness, I could not do that if I tried. My problems have to do with being undersensitive, not oversensitive.

Don't get me wrong: Harry did learn a valuable lesson. It's also a dangerously double-edged lesson and someone who wasn't Lord Voldemort might have tried to teach it a little differently.

While patterns in which warm!Harry thinks are usually good techniques to learn - and this is always true if words like "rational" or "Bayesian" are invoked or Harry thinks about how he can cite literature - things which the *Dark* characters say should be treated with, well, suspicion? Professor Quirrell a.k.a. *Lord frickin' Voldemort* is not an author mouthpiece. I shall include a disclaimer at the top of Ch. 21 to this effect.

Since many reviewers are still asking if Quirrell is Voldemort, I tried putting in a final sentence from "Professor Quirrell's" point-of-view and got such reader outrage at the unsubtlety that I gave up and removed it. I am now seriously asking for help and suggestions on what I can do to make it clear to all readers that Professor Quirrell *is* Voldemort. So far we have the following facts:

- 1) canon!Tom Riddle applied to teach Defense at Hogwarts and put a curse on the position when he didn't get it.
- 2) canon!Quirrell is possessed by Voldemort.
- 3) It has been repeated within the fic that the Dark Lord has lost his last body but is somehow still alive.
- 4) The author has summarized the First Law of Fanfiction as "Frodo gets lightsaber, Sauron gets Death Star".

There was literally *nothing else I could think of* that my readers would even *notice*, unless I wanted to have Draco eat someone's kitten, and *that wouldn't make sense*.

Warning: Potential spoilers ahead if you have not read up through Ch. 21.

Thank you to Farsan for observing that readers may still doubt regardless of any hints, and want to doubt, and hope for a twist, and forgive the *lack* of a twist later, but *not* forgive a too-early revelation that leaves *no room* for twists. This makes things much clearer to me.

And thank you to another reviewer, I can't find the name, for observing that readers placed in a viewpoint character's perspective will tend to instinctively suppress knowing anything the viewpoint character doesn't know. This is a phenomenon I genuinely had no clue about as an author.

I guess I panicked at the thought of being unable to say something to my readers that I wanted them to know, that I wanted to rely on them knowing... of being unable to share something I'd waited a while to share... but I can also see now that I shouldn't have panicked, and that the work will survive a little extra mystery even if I didn't mean it to be mysterious.

Well, thanks for helping me to become a stronger writer, Farsan and whoever else.

So! Harry's first week has just ended, 21 chapters and ~130,000 words in.

And some of you are worried about pacing.

There's an old saying that if it's boring to write, it will probably be boring to read. One of my favorite anecdotes is from a writer who decided that he would write all the exciting, fun parts of his novel first, and go back and fill in the boring middle parts later. When he had finished writing *just the fun parts*, he looked over what he had, came to an important realization, and sent the finished work off to his editor.

Now this story has a plot, an arc, and a direction, but it does *not* have a set pace. What it has are chapters that are *fun to write*. I started writing this story in part because I'd bogged down on a book I was working on (now debogged), and that means my top priority was to *have fun writing again*.

And it's not the best algorithm for writing - it won't produce the most tightly designed works of literature - but when it comes to *having fun writing each chapter*, it's hard to beat the Algorithm of Awesome, which works as follows:

First, know the overarching direction in which your fic is going. Then, think of possible events that move in this direction. If they are *awesome*, add them to the plot. If they are *not awesome*, leave them out.

After I realized that this was the algorithm I was following, I came to the further realization that some of the events I had planned beyond Harry's first week were *not awesome*, which meant that they would be no fun to write, and also would look out of place in the rest of the fic. There may be a *short* delay in updating while I revise the plot and make sure the new version is plotted correctly, and also, er, take a bit of a break actually. A *short* break. Now I know you've heard that before, but *don't panic*. I already know where this story is going and how it ends; I have things already written that would eat me in my dreams if I never got to post them; and I couldn't stop writing this if I tried. Furthermore, people have figured out my real name, and my real-life friends have found this fic, and they know where I live. So please, don't worry.

PS: Oh, and just so you know, this fic was *almost* destroyed by a single comment from Sarky on NerinOnline:

I don't normally read fanfiction, but...

... but Harry Potter and the Methods of Rationality really is quite wonderful. And nobody gets tentacle raped or anything! $^{\wedge}$

With some fast action and creative thinking, I managed to *contain* the damage Sarky did to this chapter. It's still in there - there was no way to get it out entirely - but at least you have to look *really closely* to see the tentacle rape.

Don't say things like that around me.

Author's Notes for Ch. 22, 'The Scientific Method':

Warning: Potential spoilers ahead if you have not read up through Ch. 22.

In Book 6, canon!Harry casts Sectumsempra on Draco, a curse which Harry knows is "for enemies", and, unfortunately, it works even though Harry doesn't know exactly what it's supposed to do. I've also been informed (I haven't read Book 6 yet) that Harry tries other unknown spells from the Half-Blood Prince's book to find out what they do, but hopefully I can get away with assuming that they also had some slight hints on them.

In Book 5, Padma Patil and Anthony Goldstein are appointed as Ravenclaw prefects, therefore they are Harry's scholastic competitors now. Harry's thoughts about them should be understood as rationalizing his observations of this canon-derived fact, rather than expressing my own opinions on which Ravenclaws would be expected to excel. This really ought to be clear by now, but Harry is *not* a self-insert, and I just write down what he thinks.

A reviewer pointed out that J. K. Rowling has declared Squibs to be, by definition, born to at least one magical parent; looking up the reference shows that she also said the magical gene was *dominant*. I'm not clear on how this is to be squared with the existence of Muggleborns, except, of course, by magic. Plus if the magical gene is dominant then almost all Muggleborns would presumably have only one copy, and then when two Muggleborns marry a quarter of the children would be Muggles. In this case I think I have to say that I'm just not sticking to JKR's rules, and also plead, of course, "but that wasn't in the books".

This is *the* most sciencey section which I have planned for the whole fic, so please don't panic about this being the start of an accelerating downward trend.

Please note that in this and the succeeding chapter, Harry's experimental work and reasoning and conclusions would be rejected by most scientific journals. Not saying it's *wrong*, just saying that modern scientists generally try to make their work look much more rigorous than this. (Practically all work done before the twentieth century would be rejected by any current journal; whether the higher standards are actually helping is a separate question.)

The Journal of Irreproducible Results was bought out and the entire editorial board moved to the Annals of Improbable Research which now inherits their tradition, but in 1991, when this story takes place, it was still known as the Journal of Irreproducible Results.

There've been complaints that the summary does not represent the story very well to interested readers. If you can think of a fair way to describe this story in 255 characters or less, let's hear it.

Those of you who are frantically clicking this every hour to see if it's updated - yes, I google "Methods of Rationality" and read your blog posts, so I know you're doing it - please keep in mind that you *can* subscribe to email alerts that will notify you of each new chapter.

Also, does anyone know where I can find a good, short summary of the seven books of canon, for the benefit of readers who are trying to read this without knowing anything about Harry Potter?

Author's Notes for Ch. 22-23, 'The Scientific Method' and 'Belief in Belief':

Warning: Potential spoilers ahead if you have not read up through Ch. 23.

Chapter 22 notes:

I've also been informed (I haven't read Book 6 yet) that Harry tries other unknown spells from the Half-Blood Prince's book to find out what they do, but hopefully I can get away with assuming that they also had some slight hints on them.

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Chapter 23 notes:

Thank you to The Alec for seeding my second attempt at summarizing this fic.

First reviewer to note that humans aren't the only ones who can do magic: bluepard.

Many of you offered the suggestion that the accomplishments of Merlin and the Founders had been exaggerated. I confess I didn't think of this hypothesis - hopefully I would have if Harry had been putting forth a genuine and honest effort to list out all the alternatives. I did make an absent-minded mental note that there were many more than the six listed, but that sort of major branch is still the sort of thing I should have at least thought of. What Harry is *mainly* thinking about at this point is manipulating Draco! And as I already knew the true answer relative to the fic, I myself wasn't honestly curious.

But the main evidence against this hypothesis that we'd already seen (and which Harry also saw) is the Cloak of Invisibility. Dumbledore, the most powerful wizard in the world, holds the Cloak and tells us that he can't make such a thing, that the art has been lost. In other words, there are non-duplicable artifacts lying around as continuing proof of the lost powers. And of course, the fact that these artifacts continue to *function* but can no longer be *made* is major evidence favoring hypotheses 2 and 3 over 1. In fact it's considerably *stronger* evidence than the magical creatures. It's not clear that a Dementor or phoenix is as powerful as the spells that are being lost; fading ambient magic could still be enough to support all the magical creatures because they're just not as powerful as wizards. I decided that Harry would not say this to Draco, and then also decided that it was an honest oversight on Harry's part.

I apologize to everyone who got excited about this being a Magic Fades Away story, but (cough) you should've remembered the Cloak of Invisibility and what Dumbledore said about it, plus the Sorting Hat did suggest that there were lost secrets of its creation. Also (double cough) you probably should have

suspected Harry's motives for showing his *contagious alarm* so visibly, just as Draco was first considering a scary alternative hypothesis to blood purism. (First reviewer to note this: Guile.)

Some of you have now responded that the Cloak of Invisibility was made by Death. My own research suggests that the canon!explanation is that this is a fairy tale relative to the Harry Potter universe. In any case, *here* Dumbledore clearly states that the art has been lost, and there are similar artifacts such as the Sorting Hat whose makers are known.

Many of you suggested that too many wizards are sharing a limited supply of magic, which I also didn't think of; but this I don't consider a major branch apart from "magic is fading" (the effects are not easily distinguishable).

In chapters 22-23, Harry makes two major mistakes. The first mistake is betting too much on seeing the Mendelian pattern. His recent experience with Hermione should have taught him better than to stake his manipulation of Draco on finding what Harry's logic claimed should be there. But you don't *always* lose on *every* imprudent bet.

Harry's second mistake is that magic could be on a single *chromosome* while still involving many different *genes*, and chromosomal crossover with a nonmagical homologue of the chromosome could still be degrading the quality of the magic. Muggleborns could acquire degraded magic chromosomes from Squib ancestors, which degraded chromosomes would then be reintroduced into the wizarding population. Hermione is then born from Squibs with *recent* wizarding ancestors. In fact, the apparent frequency with which Squibs are born to wizards is a counterargument that there are large amounts of vulnerable DNA on the magic-bearing chromosome. It would admittedly be improbable for all the magical genes to be on one chromosome - unless, of course, that part of the chromosome is artificial! However, the logic that purebloods should then be noticeably more powerful still goes through.

The reason why Harry overlooks this is simple: He's read about Mendelian patterns and chromosomes in books of scientific history, but hasn't studied enough genetics specifically to know about chromosomal crossover, just like me when I was his age.

I realize this is going to sound odd, but Harry is not *supposed* to know all *that* much science. He's eleven.

You can't reasonably be expected to get this reference on your own, so the idea is that the Weasley twins are a metaphor for <u>Aumann's Agreement Theorem</u>.

Because it's just that kind of fic. That's why.

One anonymous reviewer wrote: "I know I've arrived a bit late, but this story is incredible and I'm really liking it so far. Still, for your literary genius, I don't think you're capable of shipping Draco and McGonagall."

That would be *completely wrong* and it wouldn't fit into the story *at all* and it would be *impossible* to set that up while keeping everyone in character and it took my brain around thirty seconds to think of how to do it *anyway* and now I'm tempted to actually *do* it and *didn't I tell you not to say things like that around me?*

I may have to rule that this was an attempt at deliberate reverse psychology and refuse to be manipulated by it, though. Let's all hope.

Yes, there is a (canonical author-intended) solution to the impossible puzzle, but my current plan is that it will not just appear in the next chapter, though it will be mentioned in the fic eventually.

There's a lot of little things you can pick up on by reading this fic *twice*, instead of once. For example, rereading all of PQ's lines in Mary's Room, and imagining Skeeter listening to them.

Warning: Potential spoilers ahead if you have not read up through Ch. 27.

Erm, I have to say I'm a bit horrified by some of the reviews celebrating the death of Rita Skeeter. I know I didn't exactly write her as a sympathetic character, but consider yourselves lucky that the story's tone at this point didn't allow it, or Rita Skeeter would have two daughters attending Hogwarts, and the next scene would be Professor McGonagall calling them into her office to let them know that their mother went out on an assignment and never came back. I actually wrote some of that as a possible Omake. Maybe I'll finish it later.

Another possible Omake would be the scene in Mary's Room from Rita's point of view, her slight nervousness when Professor Quirrell mentioned having sealed the room, her sudden start when Professor Quirrell talked about tiny Animagi, her relief at hearing him say he wouldn't test for it, coupled with a growing fear that he already knew and was toying with her, followed by the shock of realizing that she had, somehow, been fooled by evidence that should have been unforgeable, knowing that she had to run before Lucius found her, run as fast as possible, but she was trapped in the room, listening to the words that Professor Quirrell made Harry repeat and suspecting with growing horror that she'd been righter in her article than she knew, her sudden frantic crawl as the waitress knocked and she realized that the door was about to open to let her out, and then her life ending so quickly that there wasn't even time to shift, just a single instant of realization before the crunch.

Maybe I'm just too sensitive, maybe it's just that as the author you live the life of every character in your stories, but I don't think Rita Skeeter was bad enough to deserve what, um, I did to her.

Some other readers have been saying a very silly thing, so let me state the following: It is possible that the human species has gotten through its entire history to date without a single professional editor ever sending back a story with a comment reading "This villain is too strong and needs to be weakened." Please bear this in mind when writing your own stories.

I know some of you really hate OCs, but Lesath Lestrange was inspired by Jeremiah Lestrange from "His Own Man" by Crunchysunrises, so he's not really *original;* you might consider it a sort of fanon, if that helps.

Those of you who are all like "Lily Evans was a good and virtuous woman and she broke off her friendship with Snape because he was studying Dark Arts, and she didn't go anywhere near James Potter until he stopped bullying", remember, Harry only knows the information Severus gave him. But also... a plain and poor boy is a good friend to a beautiful girl for years, and loves her, and pursues her fruitlessly; and then when the rich and handsome bully cleans up his act a bit, she goes home with him soon after... considering just how *normal* that is, I don't think you're allowed to write it and not have people at least *wonder*.

Nikara wrote in a review: "Harry reminds me so much of the kids at the gifted summer camp that I work at. His plots and the way that he speaks sounds so much like a CTY kid that it's almost uncanny."

Gosh, I thought to myself, who could these mysterious "CTY kids" possibly be -

No, I lie, I already knew that "CTY" was the Center for Talented Youth at John Hopkins, and a "CTY kid" was a high scorer on the tests they administer as part of their nationwide Talent Search program.

Author's Notes for Ch. 32, 'Coordination Problems' pt. 1:

Warning: Potential spoilers ahead if you have not read up through Ch. 32.

If you're lucky, I'll finish writing the next chapter sometime Sunday, probably late Sunday, and post it then. But my friends have been complaining about withdrawal symptoms, so I thought I'd better just post what I have.

(That's what you get for complaining about withdrawal symptoms, by the way.)

I had less fun writing this chapter than any of the others, which is probably one reason it took so long (besides the fact that I've been busy the last couple of weeks). My original plot outline didn't have this chapter in it. It just went straight to the final result before Christmas. And then I realized my readers would probably lynch me if I tried that. But I hadn't thought of anything awesome for the final battle. And I was *stuck*, because I didn't want a final battle that was completely uninteresting, and I'd used up all my good ideas on the *first* battle and set a standard I couldn't live up to, and it took me a while to come up with a premise, and then even longer to realize what the chapter's rationality-theme was, and that made it even harder to write... yeah, that all wasn't fun for me.

What fun? New <u>fan art</u> for Ch. 18 by Lanthanum, and for Ch. 30, <u>fan music</u> no less by Entropic Specter, who wrote, "Jeez, now look what you've done. You've made me make up a simple tune to sing the Sunshine Regiment's marching song to, and I'm horrible at making music! Oh well, have it anyway."

I've decided that anyone who creates fan works gets a (very brief) cameo while supplies of nameable characters last. Scott is Yvain, Matt is Reborned, Cesi is Lanthanum, Specter is Entropic Specter, and Ali and Bogdan are forward references. You also get a link to your home page or webcomic or whatever, though so far no one has asked for one.

Oh, and I *finally* got to incorporate one of my own research topics into the fic.

Several reviewers have asked why dangerous! Transfiguration allows Professor McGonagall to Transfigure her desk into a pig that breathes in oxygen and breathes out a snort of carbon dioxide.

So the first answer is that I wrote that in because it was in canon, and didn't realize it was a problem until some reviewers pointed it out. Congratulations, you win.

With that said, the obvious retroactive rationalizations are as follows: (1) Professor McGonagall used a specialized Charm rather than free Transfiguration. This is the generic explanation I left open for anything in canon that doesn't fit the rules. (2) For the same reason organisms don't eat their own waste products, pigs don't breathe out anything that'll end up incorporated when another mammal breathes it in. Plants might be in trouble, but not people. (I have no idea whether this is actually true.) (3) Once magic is in the mix, things don't work by reductionist chemistry any more, they work by Forms like the ancient Greeks believed in. Just because the desk has been Transfigured into the Form of a pig doesn't mean that the carbon dioxide breathed out has an actively Transfigured Form; the carbon dioxide has had its own Form permanently transformed by something that was Transfigured, rather than having any change maintained by active magic. Contradicted to some extent by what I had McGonagall say about a constant loss of the body's matter to the atmosphere, but I could always go back and delete that. (4) The first wizards to experiment with Transfiguration didn't realize that there ought to be a problem, so there isn't one. (5) It's an emergent phenomenon

Kevin S. Van Horn writes: "Harry is wrong in thinking that 'He wouldn't have just shown that P=NP once you had a Time-Turner, this trick was more general than that.' First of all, the problems in NP are precisely those where a solution, if it exists, can be checked in polynomial time. Thus, any problem you can solve in polynomial time with a Time-Turner is in NP. Secondly, there's the issue of what happens if no solution exists. In that case, what information do you send back in time that would let you verify in polynomial time that no solution exists? You'd have to send back some information that can be used to prove, in polynomial time, that there is no solution. This is the definition of co-NP. Thus the Time-Turner will only give you polynomial-time solutions to problems that are in *both* NP and co-NP. As a concrete illustration, consider the Traveling Salesman Problem. A salesman wants to visit each of N cities one time each and finish back at the city from which he started, and he wants to minimize the total distance traveled. To use the Time-Turner to solve this, you could get a tour (a specific order in which to visit the cities) back from the future, and you can quickly compute the length of this tour. But how do you know that there is no shorter tour?"

I'd dispute that "find the password to this network" or "find Slytherin's Chamber of Secrets" can legitimately be said to be in NP, but the point about co-NP is well-taken.

8/7/10

Author's Notes for Ch. 32, 'Personal Financial Management', and Ch. 36-37, 'Status Differences' & 'Crossing the Boundary'

Warning: Potential spoilers ahead if you have not read up through Ch. 37.

So first of all, my apologies for the snafu with 'Personal Financial Management'. I wrote this *after* I started, and *before* I finished, 'Coordination Problems', and thought that I could wrap all the Christmas sections into one narrative, via the device of a flashback. And then when I *finished* 'Coordination Problems', I realized the tone had changed, and the flashback wouldn't work. So I have inserted the chapter and then moved it into place as the new Ch. 32, which may well entail some sort of

inconvenience, and is probably a bit jarring for ongoing readers; but for all those readers who will come after, this is the best way, I think.

Expect delays on the next update. Next weekend I'll be speaking in San Francisco at a certain conference alongside James Randi (our planet's most famous skeptic, my father was on Milt Rosenberg's radio show with him around two decades ago, how time doth pass) and John Tooby (one of the founders of the field of evolutionary psychology, with whom I may get to discuss the evolutionary psychology of human general intelligence, which I've been wanting to do since forever, yay!)

It was a nice suggestion, but I don't think I can *actually* get away with starting off my talk by saying "happy happy boom boom swamp swamp". And unless he's reading the fic, we probably can't get Ray Kurzweil to say it either. Maybe I can get away with sneaking it onto a Powerpoint slide. Interestingly, my own talk shall touch upon the theme of a shortly-upcoming MoR chapter, but I doubt I'll actually be able to time it for simultaneity, fun as that would be.

(I'm not actually going to link to the conference, but I shall venture that if you were to google James Randi plus John Tooby plus Ray Kurzweil, that would point you in the correct direction.)

Author's Notes for Ch. 33-34, 'Coordination Problems' pt. 2 & 3:

Warning: Potential spoilers ahead if you have not read up through Ch. 34.

...Yeah, I know I said I'd break them up into small pieces and post them simultaneously, but these pieces aren't too small, are they? 5000 words is an okay size for a real chapter.

There is now an awesome PDF version of Methods of Rationality due to Bogdan Butnaru (cameo in 32, better cameo pending). This version, thanks to a bit of advance coordination, has Ch. 1-34; future PDFs might not always update with new chapters at the same time they're posted. If there's strong demand for a PDF version that updates at the same time as the chapter, let me know.

There is new art from <u>Alicorn</u> (webcomic, <u>Hi to Tsuki to Hoshi no Tama</u>, cameo pending), from <u>Inwitari Turelie</u> (Tania in Ch. 34)from <u>Krepta17</u> (Kimberly in Ch. 34), and **some truly beautiful fan art from** <u>UnknownCartoonsLover</u> (cameo pending).

I don't *think* most future chapters are going to be this Xanatos. I think I just had to get it out of my system by writing, at least once in my life, something more complicated than *Death Note*. In fact someone said it was more complicated than *Primer* and that was just part 1. Note that in this case, we have Harry plotting to *deliberately cause a Thirty Xanatos Pileup* among the soldiers of the other armies, which I propose should have a Xanatos Ordinal of *w*+1 (that is, omega plus one). Considering that the

chaos of the complete battle, *including* Harry's own plot and Dumbledore's, was used by Professor Quirrell to make the point of his speech, it is clear that the complete Xanatos Flowchart for this chapter would have an Xanatos Ordinal of at least 2w+1.

A word on the rules this fic follows. It is *not* a strict single point of departure. Changes from the original Harry Potter universe may occur for any of the following reasons:

- 1) Changes growing out of the fic's single point of departure a single event that happened differently, at some point in the past. For example, Petunia seems to have married a scientist.
- 2) Changes that smooth over the seams of the universe. When Rowling wrote the first book, it seems likely that she had not yet decided that there was a systematic, reliable curse on the Defense position. But of course, if the curse really had been operating for decades, everyone would have noticed and would be *expecting* something to go wrong with Professor Quirrell.
- 3) Changes that result from taking a hypothesis more seriously. For example, if Harry Potter had really saved the whole nation on October 31st, 1981, wouldn't politicians invite him to ceremonies marking the 10th anniversary?
- 4) Changes to the laws of magic so that, y'know, there *are* some. There are stories which can get away with having the laws of magic be unclear, because they are part of the background setting rather than the plot. This is not one of those stories.
- 5) Changes that result from this not being a children's book. Writing a children's book is much harder than writing a story for grownups. *I* can't do it. Therefore this is a story for grownups... and *that* means it is impossible that an evil Peter Pettigrew is hiding out as Scabbers, the pet rat of an enemy wizarding family. In a children's book, this can be taken in passing. In a story for grownups, it would mean Pettigrew was holding the Idiot Ball. It is a general law of MoR that no one is ever holding the Idiot Ball.
- 6) Changes that result from a general philosophy of upgrading obstacles to match the more powerful protagonist. One illustration of this is that in *Goblet of Fire*, there is a point where canon! Harry on a broomstick faces a dragon called the Hungarian Horntail... which in Ch. 16 of Methods is said to breathe fire quickly and accurately enough to melt a Snitch in midflight, implying that canon! Harry would have gotten roasted in an instant if he'd tried the same thing in this universe. But of course the Triwizard Tournament could not possibly take place the same way in this universe, because this is not a children's story, and in a grownup story that plan would require Lord Voldemort to be holding the complete set of all seven Idiot Balls.
- 7) Changes that are required to make the fic artistically complete when seen against the background of Harry Potter fanfiction, such as including at least one completely wrong ship.

I've posted a disclaimer in chapter one to this effect ("This is *not* a strict single-point-of-departure fic"). If anyone thinks this was a *bad* idea, now would be a good time to speak up.

Author's Notes for Ch. 38-40, *The Cardinal Sin* and *Pretending to be Wise* pts 1 & 2. Warning: Potential spoilers ahead if you have not read up through Ch. 40.

<u>Warnings</u> on this story *will update* on a certain future chapter. I have *not* yet added any spoilers to the warnings page, but I have added the anticipated name of the future chapter (still some way ahead), so that anyone worried about those sorts of warnings will be able to check the warnings page when they see that chapter title. This is so that I don't have to post, at the top of a key chapter, anything as spoilery as "Warnings have updated."

Even more fan art from the increasingly awesome Dinosaurusgede for <u>Ch. 6</u>, <u>Ch. 7</u>, and <u>Ch. 17</u>. Dinosaurusgede has cameo'd as Mr. Durian in Ch. 38 - I felt he deserved a major speaking part for all that. Also fan art by <u>Dnaliw</u> for Ch. 18, <u>Auddie</u> for Ch. 32, and <u>Kuzosama</u> for Ch. 27. Kuzosama, please contact me with your cameo information.

I expect some people won't like Ch. 39. Rest assured that it's the only plotted chapter of its kind. No other long dialogues have been planned, but I didn't see how I could avoid this one. Ch. 39 is also the largest change I needed to make to Rowling's laws of magic, emphasis on *needed* - otherwise, you perceive, character motivation goes out the window - and I plan no other deviation that large or significant.

It's an interesting question as to whether Harry is behaving as a Flat Earth Atheist with respect to his skepticism about an afterlife. To be rational, you want to have the sort of mind that, if it finds itself in a world with no afterlife, doesn't believe in an afterlife, and if it finds itself in a world with an afterlife, does believe in an afterlife. J. K. Rowling clearly believed that the Potterverse had an afterlife, and wrote it accordingly; if Harry finds himself in that universe, and he still doesn't believe in an afterlife, that's not necessarily a good sign for his rationality.

On the other hand, J. K. Rowling probably wrote the Potterverse using standard patterns she'd picked up about afterlife beliefs - what a LessWrong.com reader would call "cached thoughts". And of course these cached thoughts about 'what it means for there to be an afterlife' are all drawn from people in this universe claiming that this universe has an afterlife. Rowling is used to the idea that people who believe in an afterlife still cry at funerals, i.e., that people who profess to believe in an afterlife don't anticipate-as-if their dead friends just took a one-way trip to Australia. And Rowling didn't change that when she put her characters into a world with a Resurrection Stone. So instead of behaving like the people in Robert Sheckley's "Immortality Inc.", to whom immortality is simply a fact, the people in Rowling's Potterverse still cry at funerals, and make desperate sacrifices to protect the lives of their friends, and are devastated at their deaths; and Voldemort is still frantic for immortality at any cost, even the cost of fracturing his immortal soul so that it gets stuck in Limbo forever, which doesn't seem like a wisely calculated cost-benefit tradeoff.

But thankfully, despite her own belief that the Potterverse had an afterlife, Rowling nonetheless managed not to depict anything in her stories that would provide *strong evidence* of an afterlife - something you would *only* see in a world with an afterlife, that you wouldn't see in any other probable world. At least it looks that way as far as I can tell.

So people can doubt it without being stupid.

And that's all the story needs.

Author's Notes for Ch. 41, Interlude: Frontal Override

Warning: Potential spoilers ahead if you have not read up through Ch. 41.

Multiple reviewers have requested that short chapters be posted separately as they are written, rather than waiting until a large update can be posted all at once. I am endeavoring to serve accordingly. If anyone doesn't like that, speak ye upward.

For some odd reason, Fanfiction.net seems to be taking a while to show the new chapter after I post it. It didn't used to do that. So I'll post in the early morning when possible, to minimize the number of disappointed readers who click through immediately, in case that happens again. If this keeps up I may have to look elsewhere for mirroring.

New fan diagram by <u>Christopher Olah</u>, and a 1MB GIF fan *animation* by <u>Lanthanum</u>. Auddie gave her cameo to her boyfriend Samuel, and Dnaliw has cameo'd as Charlotte.

To be clear, the last A/N was saying that Rowling believed in an afterlife for the Potterverse, *not* that an afterlife necessarily exists in the MoR!verse. I don't know anything about that which Professor Quirrell doesn't.

Desertopa correctly observes of Ch. 39, "There are certainly ways Dumbledore could have responded to Harry's objections, and there are responses to those responses, and further responses to *those*. Notice how religious threads have a tendency to stretch out over ten pages on a regular basis?"

To those who think the argument was rigged because Dumbledore did not present Argument #127 in favor of death, rest assured that Harry did not present Argument #128 in favor of life, either. It's not like I had Harry quote the priests who, back when smallpox inoculation was being introduced, said that inoculation was "an encroachment on the prerogatives of Jehovah, whose right it is to wound and smite". (Yes, there was a whole backlash against smallpox inoculation by all the deeply wise priests who'd been going around explaining to the bereaved parents how smallpox was a necessary part of God's master plan, and if you read that history it all sounds remarkably like the sort of arguments that are being leveled nowadays against researchers who want to do basic research on curing aging...) By a similar token, there's no way that Dumbledore would ever have said anything along the lines of "But if everyone were immortal, wouldn't there be a population explosion?" or "If everyone were immortal, wouldn't the scientific process be gummed up by all the old scientists staying around instead of dying off?" Not only would that have been totally out of character for him, an argument like that is claiming that death is a necessary evil - that if we could just build liquid fluoride thorium reactors, or legislate that each immortal couple have at most 2 children (linear growth being quite manageable), then death would no longer be necessary and we could all live happily ever after. Which is not what Dumbledore believes at all. And claiming that we all ought to die just so that science can move along faster is a silly

argument, you'd just pass a law forcing senior scientists to retire, not *kill* them. If I'd had Dumbledore say *that*, it would have (a) depicted Dumbledore as clutching at straws to defend death rather than speaking from his heart, and (b) given Harry a much-too-strong position from which to crush Dumbledore with the obvious rejoinders. And that, needless to say, is *not* what Ch. 39 was about. It is what would *actually happen* between that Harry and that Dumbledore, as best as I could possibly write it down.

Some people thought that I was throwing the debate to Harry. Apparently I am so terribly incompetent at throwing debates that I managed to *accidentally* write Harry as angry and Dumbledore as calm. And accidentally have Professor Quirrell exude a deathly chill while he agrees with Harry. And accidentally describe Dumbledore's hand as "a little wizened by time, but still strong". (No, dears, this is not the same way Ayn Rand wrote *Atlas Shrugged*.) Along the same lines, and with more or less the same degree of plausibility, someone also thought that I was so terribly incompetent at math as to not know how induction works on positive integers. This degree of mistrust in the author can decrease a reader's enjoyment of a story, so while individuals are of course entitled to distrust whoever they like, I do suggest that sort of *unrealistic* distrust ought to be kept out of the main TV Tropes page, and moved to the discussion section. Thank you.

The obvious response to this would be to start inserting actual slash. But while I'd willingly take a pill that made me bisexual, this pill does not yet exist, so right now, writing actual slash would be about as much fun for me as a root canal.

So behold this rant, then:

I think of myself as someone who deliberately cuts against the grain of status and prestige. Which, of course, is something that everyone likes to think about themselves. But then again, my claim *does* have a certain credibility, because I had a reputation as a "real" writer before I started writing Harry Potter fanfiction, and I did that with malice aforethought to intentionally drop myself down multiple levels on the Geek Hierarchy. Snobbery offends me; I am offended by people who are prejudiced against beauty because of its form or its medium. I am offended by people who think "Calvin and Hobbes" can't be real

art because it's a comic strip, and I can curse them with no darker fate than that they go look at some ugly, pointless, fake "modern art" that will impress their friends more. And I am equally offended by people who look down on fanfiction because it's fanfiction, who'd take something beautiful like "Always and Always" and turn up their noses at it. So I write Harry Potter fanfiction and be damned to them all. Someday, when I think I can get away with it, I will write deep intellectual self-insert pornography that is even better than MoR just so I can watch people's heads explode.

That, at any rate, was the damn-the-torpedoes, screw-the-critics, defiant iconoclastic spirit in which I decided to write this wacky little story just for fun, during my downtime from working on a nonfiction rationality book.

I should not have been surprised, but I was, to find my work being read by many people who took their Harry Potter fanfiction *extremely seriously*, and who were shocked at the way I was casually violating some of their most cherished artistic conventions.

And if I claimed that there was anything *odd* about taking Harry Potter fanfiction just as seriously as, say, 18th-century classical music, then I would of course be revealing *myself* as a great big snobby snob.

I came in thinking that I was making a great show of defiant iconoclastic spirit by writing Harry Potter fanfiction, and that means I wasn't nearly as iconoclastic as I thought. And for this I am heartily ashamed.

However.

If you think that *everyone* who writes Harry Potter fanfiction should take it as seriously as you take yours, and that it is sinful for anyone to enjoy it unless it's done *exactly your way* according to *your* favorite artistic conventions, then you are being a snob about *Harry Potter fanfiction*. I am just barely sensitive enough to the status conventions of the real world to notice that this is a tiny bit incongruous.

Don't get me wrong. You can write Harry Potter fanfiction. You can take it seriously. You can craft it with care. You can make it mature, emotional, and deep. You can have artistic conventions, and criticism of work that tries to obey those conventions and fails. And you can do all that with a straight face, because beauty knows no law but beauty.

What you cannot do with a straight face is be a great big snobby snob about Harry Potter fanfiction.

You cannot, for example, claim that *your* kind of Harry Potter fanfiction is real art, but that no Harry Potter fanfiction which involves slash can possibly be taken seriously.

Not unless you have stayed in your tiny little corner of the Internet for so long that you have totally lost perspective on what the rest of the world thinks about Harry Potter fanfiction in the first place.

I envy that she has the sort of readers where if she writes the initials R.A.B., people will pour through all her previous books looking for a character with those initials and solve the hint. 'Cuz I have been diligently embedding hints all through MoR. I bet that if you were to reread MoR and copy everything that looks like a hint into a separate document, and then look through all of the hints at once, you would, like, notice some stuff. Just sayin'.

A word of advice: When you are recommending this fic to friends, do not tell them that Harry destroys a Dementor. One reviewer noted that Dementor destruction has been done many, many times, and to their knowledge, it was done well exactly *once*, and that was in Ch. 45 of this fic. It is a legendarily awful mark of horrible HP fanfiction, which is one of the reasons I did it, knowing full well that afterward nobody would ever be able to do it again. There is, however, no possible way to convey "there's a Dementor takedown, only it's good" to someone who hasn't read the fic. Not only is it a spoiler, there is just no way they'll *believe* you. It's like trying to say, "Ch. 42 has Professor Quirrell saving Harry from certain death at the hands of a yaoi fangirl horde, only it's not crack." If someone hasn't seen that, they won't believe it just because you say so.

Arielrondil gets credit for being first to observe the implications of a *speak with plants* spell. I also see that "The Unfortunate Implications of Parsletongue" [sic] was a thread in the Dark Lord Potter forum - started by someone with a *Methods of Rationality* quote in his signature, no less. Rest assured that the Dark Lord Potter forum lived up to its usual standard, if not quite perhaps its *advertised* standard, for intelligent and informed discussion.

When I started writing Chapter 1 of this fic I misremembered Petunia as fat, while canon describes her as overly thin. (When I wrote Chapter 1, I didn't know if anyone was going to be interested at all in a fic like this, so I didn't do the checking my reviewers have now trained me to do.) Several people have complained about this, so I've now edited Chapter 1 so that Lily's potion makes Petunia prettier but does not make her lose weight *per se*.

Since the last A/N a number of people have discussed hints and gotten a few good ones, including one reader who got a hint in Ch. 46 that was so subtle that I didn't think *anyone* was going to get it. You have restored my faith in my readership.

A request:

When one writes nonfiction like, say, an explanation of quantum mechanics or Bayes's Theorem, and publish it online for free, it's widely viewed as a public service. And if one encourages people to link to it, well, that's just trying to promote some free helpful online materials - it's not like you're trying to sell them an expensive textbook.

I do worry that things might be different in the fanfiction community, where all fanfiction is free, and not charging for your material isn't seen as so much of a public service. And so I fear that asking people to, say, blog this fic, might be seen as too much self-promotion... but in point of fact MoR *is* intended as a public service just as much as when I write a nonfictional explanation of Bayes's Theorem. (Of course it's also an indulgence of my fiction-writing addiction and I get kicks when people read it, as with all fanfiction, but it's not *just* that.)

And just like spending a month writing up a sequence on the proper use of words doesn't do much good if no one knows it exists, the work I put into MoR only does as much good as there are people who hear about MoR.

So let me put it this way: If you merely *enjoy* MoR, then you can easily whack back that tennis ball by leaving reviews, which I myself enjoy. But if you learned from MoR, or changed your mind, or the fic otherwise succeeded in having a real impact on you - and that's something you think is valuable and

would want to share with other people - then do please blog if you have a blog, tweet if you have followers, or just tell your friends if you have any friends. (I suggest the Twitter keyword #hpmor.)

To encourage this, I intend to start doing a roundup of the latest blog posts in each A/N, and hope that this is not seen as too offensive by the usual fanfiction community. Email the URL of your blog post to (sentience at pobox dot com), since Fanfiction.net eats URLs in private messages.

I've also started listing social network pages for *Methods of Rationality*. So far I see a <u>Facebook</u> page and a listing in <u>StumbleUpon</u>. Any others? (As above, email since FF.net eats URLs in private messages.)

And to show that I believe in the categorical form of the imperative, I now link to Hybrid Theory by Blade and Epsilon, a (gigantic) fanfiction which had an impact on my mind with respect to the concept of Determination. (Oh, and it's also so epic that it makes the Lord of the Rings look like a squirtgun fight, but that's not why I'm linking it.)

I did not realize until now that Twilight vampires are literally supposed to sparkle if they go into sunlight; I thought that was people making fun of Stephanie Meyer. Meyer can't possibly have not been giggling to herself as she did that... I hope? Dear Merlin, I hope...

It seems that someone signing themselves "DLP Anonymous" - i.e. Dark Lord Potter - edited my Wikipedia article to note that I wrote "mediocre Harry Potter fanfiction". Stay classy, DLP! I'd be tempted to retaliate in kind, only the Dark Lord Potter forum doesn't have a Wikipedia entry, because they fail the notability test, because nobody ever mentions them in newspapers or anything, because they're completely unimportant.

Although to be fair, there was *one* intelligent thing said on DLP about Methods of Rationality, which is that the pacing more closely resembles a season of TV episodes with an overall arc, than a movie. I'm considering whether or not to include a note to this effect in the Ch. 1 preamble.

(I recently gave this bit of advice about foreshadowing, believable character changes, and tightening chains of causality, and thought I would include it here, somewhat edited:)

A good story shows things in this order:

(A implies B)

(A)

(B)

So in this case, you want to show e.g. Tom Riddle thinking about the perfect happy utopia of Muggleborn-free wizardry that he plans to create (A implies B), then show him seeing the horror that Voldemort created (A), then show him regretting it (B). Not that this has to be Tom's *exact* motivation, but *something* shown in advance has to make it plausible that he will experience regret instead of laughing in delight.

The *wrong* way to do it is (A), (B), (A implies B), that is, an event occurs for no reason obvious at the time and is rationalized to the reader afterward. Suppose I'd written Ch. 45 by first showing Harry's happy thought about the defeat of Death (A), having that destroy the Dementor (B), and *only then* explained to the reader that Dementors are Death and that animal Patronuses work by forgetting Death (A implies B). Lo, it would have sucked. [If anyone requotes this elsewhere, please remove the last two sentences to avoid spoilers!]

So you wouldn't write:

Hermione likes Ron. (A)

Hermione likes Tom. (B)

Hermione thinks about why she switched. (A implies B)

This sort of out-of-order causality happens when you make a mistake and then try to fix it afterward, and the wonderful thing about the nonlinear time of an author is that every time you find yourself trying to excuse something you feel uncomfortable with, the correct thing to do is go back and rewrite so that you never made the mistake in the first place.

One also needs to avoid making the (A implies B) too cliched and obvious, having it evidently be nothing but the setup, i.e., Hermione thinking about how she wishes Ron were more dominant. Having Hermione think of Ron as an adorable nebbish "despite his bad grades" would work.

So that's my advice, please take it with a grain of salt, and the moral is that there are no premature character changes, there are only unbelievable character changes. The delay before character change

occurs isn't there to stretch things out, it's to show things in advance that make the causality more believable.

Yes, "lead-pipe Legilimency" is a deliberate play on "rubber-hose cryptanalysis" (fun fact: my father is a friend of Bruce Schneier); it's just that "rubber-hose Legilimency" does not sing properly. For this, someone on TV Tropes awards me a Missed Moment of Awesome. Oh ye of little faith.

I shall remark, regarding the appearance of Dumbledore, that regardless of whether a character is good or evil, it is an unvarying rule of fiction that problems are solved by protagonists. If Dumbledore solves

your story's problems, that means Dumbledore is the protagonist. And if Dumbledore is not the protagonist, he is not allowed to solve your story's problems.

I shall also remark that the writing behind this chapter follows what I think of as the "Anvil Chorus" plot structure. Is there a TV Trope for that? (The greatest exemplar of the Anvil Chorus I've seen is *Midshipman's Hope* and the other Seafort Saga books by David Feintuch.)

After I post Ch. 63, I'm going on a hiatus (which I don't expect to last any longer than one month) while I (a) plot out the next sequence, (b) finish up the first draft (emphasis on *draft*) of my nonfiction rationality book which seems to have turned into two books actually, and (c) now that it's certain I can produce the books, go looking for a publisher who's willing to put a heavy push behind them. The nonfiction books won't be *quite* as popularly targeted as MoR, but they'll be as popular as I can make them; and they contain enough concentrated rationality that if anyone tried to read the whole thing in

one go, the sheer magnitude of enlightenment would pop their brain like a party favor. I expect them to generate enthusiasm. If you're from a publisher that can potentially push the books hard enough that they live up to their potential, drop me an email (sentience at pobox dot com).

(And if a book on rationality doesn't sound like a bestseller to you, consider that as soon as this fic gets another 24 reviews, the fifth most reviewed Harry Potter fanfiction, out of over half a million contenders, will be a fic whose premise is that Harry Potter is a rationalist. There's a larger demand for rationality than you might think.)

After the hiatus I may *try* to slow down the pace; I think I'm pressuring myself too much to update quickly. Sometimes it's hard to remember that writing this fic is supposed to be *fun*; and we are now heading into increasingly heavy waters instead of light humor and that's harder for me to write. But don't worry, I hate unfinished fics, and I try not to become what I hate.

I think I've finally come up with an answer to everyone who asks "How long is this fic going to be?", which is that it will *resolve at least as much* as got resolved in canon, but *in less story time*.

To whoever started a rumor that the fic had stopped at Ch. 58: When this fic is over *you will all notice*, okay? It will not be the sort of thing you would accidentally miss. Thank you.

Ch. 17 has now been retconned so that Dumbledore now speaks of Lily's "friend" instead of "boyfriend", since the original was an error on my part rather than an intended departure from canon.

Ch. 1 now mentions up front that the pace of this story is that of *serial fiction*, i.e., that of a TV show running for a predetermined number of seasons, whose episodes are individually plotted but with an overall arc building to a final conclusion.

Those of you who complained I did not foreshadow other students having Time-Turners, reread Daphne's aftermath in Ch. 46.

I hereby dub this fan couple "Voldandy" and I can't see why no one's written it yet, they're perfect for each other. Yes, in Ch. 63, Dumbledore plots to trap Voldemort in a Veela bond with Belldandy. Methods of Rationality: *Still* not crack.

Other reader-suggested solutions to Harry's dilemma in Ch. 62 - which I didn't think of, because once I came up with my own solution, I stopped looking to see if there were better ones, a rather common mistake - would be to Polyjuice someone else wearing a Time-Turner into Harry, or Memory-Charm Professor Flitwick. I don't think those are better solutions than PQ's, but they're good enough to deserve mention.

I don't usually give shoutouts to reviews but I'll make an exception for <u>k1000a92</u>.

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Writing these last three chapters over the last week or so, totaling 29,000 words by FF's count, in one damn week - if I'd done this whole sequence in November, I would've won NaNoWriMo - made me realize a simple point that is very obvious in retrospect.

I cannot announce update times in advance.

I cannot even update on a sufficiently predictable basis that my readers *anticipate* a particular update time in advance, such as a weekend, and write sad, pleading <u>Twitter updates</u> when I don't.

Because then I have to get the update done by that particular time.

And that turns HP:MoR into work.

Obvious in retrospect, but I just hadn't caught on before; the Aha! moment was when I realized that I might have trouble enjoying my hiatus because of *needing* to update 30 days forward, and not having an update done yet.

So my *revised* plan is that I will *start working on the fic again* after no more than one month of hiatus, but you may *not* get an update directly at the end of one month, and for the love of heavens, don't ask "Where is it?" one month from now. I was working *faster* before I started trying to update on a predictable basis. I think I *have* to be unpredictable and work on the fic whenever the whim strikes and update whenever, because otherwise it starts turning into a job.

I strongly advise that you add the RSS feed, or sign up for fanfiction.net to get Story Alerts by email.

The best I can offer you people who keep on mashing the damned intermittent reward button like lab rats - it hurts me to think about you doing that, seriously, it *does*, it makes me feel like some kind of horrible drug pusher - is that **the next update will go live at 7PM Pacific Time on some unknown day**, so there is **no point in checking every five minutes**.

Meanwhile, remember, over the next month, that I *have* written other things than MoR. There is a whole universe of <u>Less Wrong sequences</u> out there; and this also seems like a good time to mention my short story <u>The Sword of Good</u>; and for no particular reason, <u>The Simple Truth</u> and <u>Twelve Virtues of Rationality</u>.

And before anyone starts any silly rumors, the fic is not over, Harry's first year is not over (how would that even work?), and it is still the second Sunday of February in story time.

Sorry about the long pause between updates. Partially this is because we're in a bridging section of the fic, which is harder to write. It takes my brain a while to produce bridge that has the requisite minimum level of HPMOR-ness per paragraph. There's some other reasons for this particular delay, at least one of them counterintuitive, but I shalln't go into that. Writing sections that are heavy on dialogue is often quite arduous for me - I think mostly because I worry too much that people will hate dialogue-heavy sections.

I can't honestly say that I learned anything from them that I didn't already know, but a couple of mentions for interesting fics: "The Key to a Successful Interview is a Good First Impression!" is a Ranma 1/2 fic which obeys the First Law of Fanfiction, as follows: Ranma has emotional maturity, Akane has self-awareness, and Shampoo has a belt-fed grenade launcher. THIS is how you do a First Law fic. Also "The Dark Lords of Nerima" features a great deal of plotting and a certain amount of humor and is quite well-written and I suspect some HPMOR readers may enjoy it.

I'm sorry about the recent dropoff in *Methods of Rationality* speed. I'm not sure myself what exactly is going on, and my main hypotheses are as follows: (1) Writing the *second* draft of my nonfiction rationality book, where I'm actually polishing sentences, is using up the same cognitive resources as writing MoR, in a way that writing the *first* draft did not. (2) I've been running around doing a lot of talking with people and socializing, instead of staying quietly in my apartment writing things, and this has taken up my time and energy. (3) Either this current bridging section with S.P.H.E.W., or more scarily MoR generally, seems to be less fun to write now - perhaps because I made the terrible mistake of trying to update on a regular schedule, but possibly also because the previously planned plotline had some trouble with basic things like conflict, tension, and character goals. Currently thinking about how to fix this.
